Mounting a 720 kB disk drive into a Philips VG 8235/00

Warning:

The most important part in the computer is the printed circuit board (PCB). Parts can be replaced, but not the PCB. Do not try to unsolder the parts, but cut them loose and then remove the solder pins. The use of IC sockets is recommended.


The Philips VG 8235 comes with a single sided disk drive (360 kB). This instruction is only for the Philips VG 8235/20 (see underside of computer). The Philips VG 8235/00 is significantly different. For this model a separate manual is available.

Disassembly

- Remove the case, there are two clips, one on each side of the outer casing.
- Remove the keyboard, it is attached to a board with a band wire that can be unplugged.
- Remove the AV-PCB.
- Remove the disk drive.
- Remove the power supply PCB.
- Remove the main board.

Main board changes


- Remove U50, the disk-ROM (placed in an IC socket).
- Insert the new disk-ROM (27C512 EPROM) into the empty socket of U50. This new system-ROM is required for double-sided operation.
- At the bottom side of the main board two extra connections need to be added (located at the disk drive connector side of the main board).

The new disk-ROM, inserted into the IC socket of U50.





Adjustments to the power supply


The original disk drive of the Philips VG 8235 uses a 14-pin connector. Also, it requires both +12V DC and +5V DC. The replacement disk drive has a 34-pin connection and requires only +5V DC. Because the new disk drive requires more power from the +5V DC powerline distortions can be seen on the screen during disk activity. This problem can be solved by replacing coil L3 on the power supply PCB with a wire.

The power supply's PCB before the adjustment.




The power supply's PCB after replacing L3 with a wire.

Adapting the 14-pin disk drive cable

The existing cable can be reused, but it needs to rewired. This is done by putting several wires to different positions on the 14-pin connector at the disk drive side of the cable. It can then be plugged into the 34-pin disk drive connector. The 'thicker' gray wire (pin 11) is a ground wire, it is connected next to the red wire in the 4-pin power connector of the disk drive.

Connections of the 14-pin cable:

Mounting the disk drive

The 720 kB disk drive has to be compatible for usage in an MSX computer. Also, for using it as an A drive it has to be configured properly. Before mounting the disk drive, a filler piece is mounted on top of it. This is done to give it same height as the original disk drive. A piece of 15x15 mm angle profile can be used for this. It can be glued on using a sealant adhesive or double sided tape. The disk drive fits exactly on the original bottom bracket.

All parts are now ready and everything can be put together.
